



The contemporary circus is taking up ever more space on the world stage, and new academic research is looking to examine its impulses and implications. This three-day conference explores questions of difference in contemporary circus. It asks how the mainstreaming of the field may be affecting circus's historic status as a site for the celebration and exploitation of differences, from stagings of exceptional performing bodies to the display of "freakery." Discussions will touch on gender, sexuality, disability, ethnicity, social class, and race.
